Description

This course provides students with a survey of the first two centuries of colonial America and the first century of the Republic. The lectures focus upon the changing political economy of the United States, while the readings offer students more social approaches to the past. This course has the following aims: to provide students with an interesting narrative; to examine documents and evaluate secondary sources; and to encourage critical thinking.
