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Description:

This survey course provides an international approach to American history. It is divided into four units: Atlantic World; Age of Revolutions; Early Industrial Capitalism; Nation-Building. It has three objectives: enable students to understand the multiple spatial and temporal contexts of U.S. history; help them appreciate the historicity of nation-building; prepare students to understand the contemporary world.

Requirements:

- 1: You are expected to attend lecture. I will provide an overview of some of the key questions, issues and debates concerning U.S. history in international perspective. <u>Bring the readings to lecture</u>.
- 2: You are expected to attend and participate in section-discussion. The Teaching Assistants will lead discussion based upon the readings for that week. It is advisable that you do the reading earlier rather than later. Your attendance/participation is worth 20%.
- 3: You will write a take-home mid-term exam. It will consist of one document analysis and one essay style question of 3 typewritten pages each. The mid-term draws upon the materials covered in lecture, section, and reading up until fall break. It equals 40%.
- 4: You will write a take-home final exam. It will consist of one document and one essay style question of three pages each. The exam draws upon the materials covered in lecture, section, and reading up until the semester's end. This is 40% of your grade. You must fulfill all requirements in order to pass the class.
