DESCRIPTION OF COURSE:

We will be examining biographical and autobiographical texts, which were produced in abundance in Europe and its colonies in the period between 1350 and 1700. At the heart of our inquiry is what scholars call "the construction of identities," how individuals perceive and present their own lives, or the lives of others. We will read and discuss together some representative texts from the period and identify analytical categories such as class, gender, geographical origin, profession, religious orientation, political persuasion, intended audience, and genre. Students will then choose a text or several texts to investigate and contextualize on their own. There is a wealth of material in English in Jackson Library. I have compiled a bibliography to aid you in making your choices, and will, of course, be available throughout the semester for consultation.

GUIDELINES AND RESPONSIBILITIES:

This is a research seminar, which means that the main goal of the semester is producing a research paper of 15-25 pages in length (minimum of 15 full pages). The final version of the paper counts for 60% of the final grade. In addition, students will produce a series of written research exercises, worth 25% of final grade, and make a number of oral presentations, which, together with class participation, will count for 15% of the final grade.

I do not plan to lecture at any length in this class, thus student participation is **CRUCIAL** to its success. Let me remind you that the Renaissance was a great age of oratory as well as written masterpieces!

Make every effort to attend each class meeting. If you are not prepared to attend consistently, come on time, and stay until the end of the class period, please drop the course. If, because of illness or another legitimate excuse you must miss a class or arrive late, please contact me ahead of time so I don't have to hold up the class for the other students. I will check my messages and e-mail before each class meeting. Three unexcused absences will result in a student being dropped from the course. If you are not prepared to pay close attention and take careful notes during class periods, please drop this course. Laptop computers are not permitted in the classroom except in documented cases of need. Cellphones and other electronic equipment must be turned off and placed out of sight during class. Texting during class is extremely rude and indicates a lack of respect for one's classmates and for the instructor.
